



"And the things you have heard me say..."

2 Timothy 2:2



Jesus commanded the eleven to 'go and make disciples of all nations ... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you' (Matthew 28:19-20). How might so few undertake such a task? The solution was to multiply trained leaders of godly character across the Early Church. The Apostle Paul encouraged Timothy to entrust the teaching he had learned from him to other reliable people who in turn would be able to teach yet more people (2 Timothy 2:2).

The multiplication of trained church leaders is as necessary today as it was in the first century. During 2017, The Kerusso Trust and its partner J-Life Malawi have launched 'Entrust', a new training programme designed to equip church leaders in Malawi to become trainers of other church leaders.

Over the past four years, The Kerusso Trust and J-Life Malawi have run the 'Learn2Serve' Bible and ministry training

programme in a number of rural areas across Southern Malawi. 'Learn2Serve' offers a basic Biblical 'toolkit' for disciplemaking, servant leadership and practical ministry for rural church leaders, both men and women. Around 1,000 church leaders so far have attended at least some of the four levels of 'Learn2Serve' training.

We developed 'Learn2Serve' to be a 'castwide' training programme. By this, we mean any church leader in the locality is welcome to attend, provided they are willing to sit under the authority of Christ and His Word. This approach reflects Jesus' own example in the sending out of the seventy-two (Luke 10:1-20). He gave them basic training for ministry and then feedback after they returned.

Yet in his time on earth, Jesus also focussed his training on a smaller number of specific disciples, the twelve (Mark 3:14). He spent quality time with them, taught them in greater depth and eventually made them responsible to continue His work. In July and October, we brought together about 25

people, a few selected from each 'Learn2Serve' cohort, to attend 'Entrust'.

So what is 'Entrust'? It is an intensive residential training programme, held in two blocks of two weeks at the J-Life site. The programme covers topics like how to teach, disciple-making, servant leadership, basic theology, serving and caring for the church and wider community, the Bible as God's big story, interpreting the Bible and expository preaching. The goal is both personal development and training so they can equip others.

The participants showed such a passion to learn and desire to put the training into practice. During the two months' gap between the two parts of 'Entrust', some already started training local groups.

As one participant said, "We will organise meetings to teach people from what we have learned, and this will have a great impact on the Church in Malawi."

Teach a girl and educate a nation

In rural Malawi, many girls drop out of Primary School and fewer still complete Secondary School. Multiple challenges contribute to parents withdrawing girls from school. Wingate Girls Christian School, working with The Kerusso Trust, is helping able girls to receive Secondary Education – to break the cycle of illiteracy, poverty and social vulnerability among village women.

"Teach a Girl and you educate a Nation" is an often-heard quote in Malawi. Educating a girl brings so many benefits - to the girl herself, her family and indeed the whole village community. Every extra year that a girl stays in school improves her opportunities of earning a living and helps her better teach and care for her future children. Education also means she can read the Bible for herself, and so grow in her Christian faith.

Wingate Girls Christian Secondary School near Likuni has now been open for six years. Originally a day school, many girls have already been helped. Yet, the challenges for day pupils are enormous, even with bursary support. The risks associated with walking long distances alone to school, lack of food and essentials like uniform, home pressures to help with household chores, and cultural expectations for early marriage and pregnancy all contribute to girls dropping out of school.

Over the last two years, Pastor Bright Gama, Director of the School, has added two simple boarding hostels. Currently almost 90 girls attend the school, of whom about 70 are boarders. Boarding in term time, and then returning home to the village for holidays, offers so many benefits – friendships with other able girls, pastoral care, good nutrition, a conducive atmosphere for learning, and access to study facilities including solar lighting at night. When Ruth Groves visited recently, she found a warm and supportive environment, a dedicated group of staff, and girls eager to learn.


Bright's strategy is to select one girl from each surrounding village and "rescue her" by offering a boarding place. While each girl's situation is unique, those awarded bursaries share a desire and ability to learn. Typically, they will be orphans, one of several children brought up only by their mother or grandmother, living in a grassroofed house lacking electricity and piped water. Without this opportunity for schooling, many would be married by the time they are 15.


The Kerusso Trust has worked with Bright since the school began. In recent months, we have helped to upgrade the security at the school after a gang of thieves broke in during the night, replace the classroom roofs, and installed a solar powered borehole to provide abundant water. Mains water charges have been spiraling upwards and this will make such a difference in the school's drive to become self-sustaining.

Learning and Serving as an Intern


In August 2016, The Kerusso Trust, in partnership with J-Life, launched a two year Intern Programme, offering training and experience in all aspects of J-Life's work. We spoke to Ernest Nakari, our first intern, about his life and faith.

I prayed and just before the start of term someone offered to sponsor me!

Why did you become a J-Life intern?

For several years, I was on the J-Life Youth Discipleship programme. Through this, God gave me a desire to learn and to teach. So when I heard about the

internship, I thought, yes, this is for me.



I help in all aspects of J-Life's ministry – administration and translation for 'Learn2Serve', working alongside Anthony in the youth programme,

counselling young people, helping Praise and Elijah with community outreach, and Donel with the Community Children's Bible Clubs. Ernest and Calista Nakari

Tell us about the family you grew up in?

I was the sixth born in a family of eight children in Bangwe township. My mother died when I was five years old. My father remarried when I was thirteen so for many years I did not know the love of a mother.

How did you come to faith in Jesus Christ?

I came from a Christian family, going to church each week. One day God spoke to me through preaching from Luke 24 about the disciples on the road to Emmaus. I realised that like those disciples, I knew about Christ, but I did not know Him. That is when I asked Jesus to be my Lord and Saviour. Soon afterwards, I started teaching in Sunday school. As I read the Bible and prepared the lessons, my faith grew and I started to love the work of the Lord. I became a church youth leader and was given opportunities to preach.

You were a teacher before going to Bible College in 2011. How did that happen?

After leaving school, I set up a tutoring business with a friend, teaching Maths, Science and English. I loved teaching but God had another plan! He was giving me a thirst to understand the Bible and this was encouraged by the pastor of my church who was also the Principal of the Evangelical Bible College in Blantyre. 
In addition to visiting church groups,

Connex and Synollia brought much blessing during their recent visit, and it is clear just how much the Church in the UK has to learn from the Church in Malawi.

The Birth of a Library

Over the last six years, The Kerusso Trust has had the wonderful privilege of seeing God direct people's lives and bring together many generous partners to establish something new for His Kingdom.

The story began in 2011, when Jonathan Groves, Director of The Kerusso Trust, wrote a Bible College dissertation based on field research among rural pastors in Malawi. While conducting this research, the Lord brought Jonathan together with Rev Connex Ijalasi who outlined the acute need for basic vocational training to help the 90%+ of pastors who have never received any training for their ministry. Connex and Jonathan sensed a call to work together to develop what later became the 'Learn2Serve' training programme.

However, God had further plans for this dissertation! Three years later, in March 2014, Jonathan and his wife Ruth had the honour of hosting the Langham Partnership's International Director, Dr Chris Wright, when he visited their church.

During conversations over dinner, Chris suggested that Jonathan might seek publication of his dissertation by Langham. A year later, the book 'Reading Romans at Ground Level'* became the first title in Langham's Global Perspectives Series.

In God's wisdom, the publication of this book was to become a small step toward a much bigger project. Jonathan and Connex knew there was also a need to help those pastors that had previously attended Bible College but now had no access to any study materials. They dreamed of a Resource Centre with a library, but how and when might the books and building come about?

The following year, Connex visited the UK. As he travelled with Jonathan, the two of them called in at the Langham offices in Carlisle. They shared their vision for equipping rural church leaders and a Training and Resource Centre on the J-Life site. Over the next few weeks, Langham together with other partners like Opal Trust, wonderfully and unexpectedly brought together a shipment of books to serve as a starter library for church leaders in Malawi.

But where were we to house them? Within two months, funding was coming into The Kerusso

Trust from many people and construction of the Resource Centre began. A year later in May 2016, the building was amazingly completed, the project overseen by an expert local construction engineer who had volunteered his services freely.

Yet God had still more to come. In March 2016 following a social media posting, Jonathan was offered another generous donation of over 2,500 theological books from the library of his former Bible College, now called the Scottish School of Christian Mission. With logistic and financial support from Langham, The Kerusso Trust shipped the books to Malawi. The library, now having almost 5,000 volumes, will be opening by the end of 2017.
